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Message from the President and the Executive Director

A few years ago, The Arts Council of England, concluded a study on the measurement of value and impact in the cultural sector. They described the exercise as "... impossibly complex and ultimately unknowable...". Nevertheless, they gave it their best shot – the report runs more than 150 pages - the Executive Summary runs 19 pages. Essentially, what they argued is that there are two types of impact: those where culture makes a contribution to wider policy areas (economic growth, health and education) and those which are associated with benefits to the individual (happiness or inspiration). The report concluded that 'cultural value' cannot always adequately be expressed in traditional units of measure and that, indeed, the cultural value of an experience may be lost if it is assessed in traditional terms.

Our Books on Wheels service serves some 40 individuals So, while measuring impact may be difficult, we note American Supreme Court Justice, Potter Stewart's comment on the ambiguity of definition with regard to obscenity, famously stating that, while he could not precisely define it, "I know it when I see it." One could say the same about impact in the cultural sector – here are just a very few examples of the JPL at work:

Libraries help people learn about their own history. Some time ago, an elderly man was led to the JPL Archives by a volunteer from the Montreal Holocaust Museum. He explained, in halting English that all he wanted to find out was what had happened to his parents during the war – on March 19th, 1944, the Nazis

occupied his hometown in Hungary and herded some 11,000 Jews from the area into a ghetto. "Laszlo", then 4 years old, was given over to a non-Jewish couple who raised him. Eventually, he emigrated to Montreal, married, and raised a family on Montreal's south shore. Over a period of 2 weeks, we searched genealogical databases, consulted with experts in Jewish genealogy, emailed officials in Hungary and Israel and, eventually, were able to secure a list of the names of inhabitants of Laszlo's ghetto guarter, to where they had been deported and when they had perished, in Auschwitz. When Laszlo returned to the Library, he was presented with a large file consisting of our research. He took it over to a study carrel, carefully read through it and left. He had closed a 40 year breach in his life. We helped him learn about his history. We are not certain how to measure that impact but we know it when we see it.

Libraries help new immigrants to integrate. Albert Einstein said – *"The only thing that you absolutely have to know is the location of the library."* For newly arrived immigrant families, their first year is made easier through being members of the JPL where they can go on their own, when they want, with no stigma attached, regardless of finances or circumstance. Our children's library now has a French story time twice a month to engage the growing French immigrant community. They also borrow reading materials for their children and themselves, in English and French, beginning to adjust to the language of their new home. That first year of membership is free, allowing for access our to computer center where they can create and send out CVs for job applications, scan and send lease agreements, passport documents, visas and Medicare applications, search for apartments, set up their internet connection and phone line and contact family back home or accomplish something as simple as finding a shop that sells that particular brand of chocolate, which they so enjoyed back home.

Almost 6000 Russian items circulated last year, the second most borrowed language in the library. The JPL runs a Russian Literary Club that began with a simple book exchange. Over the course of two years, it's grown from about a dozen individuals to more than 200 members with monthly meetings hosting journalists, performers and authors. We also convene an annual evening of Russian culture with more than 400 people enjoying local Russian talent. Ex-soviet Russian Jews delight in visiting the familiar sounds, tastes and sights of their youth. Attendees are intergenerational, with young adults bringing their parents and their children to share with each other and the non-Russian population. This is integration at its best and attendees keep coming back - unlike hospitals or prisons, the JPL, as with theatres, museums, concert halls, and purchasing in the private sector, sees repeat visits as a success indicator. This strikes us as significant impact – we know it when we see it.

Libraries provide economic value to the community and, in particular, to vulnerable individuals. Drawing on the first of the Arts Council of England's definitions of impact (economic, health and education), and as only one example of many from amongst our some 3000 members, one of our families has borrowed \$41,893.81 worth of materials from the Jewish Public Library including everything from inspirational Jewish fiction, to children's books to Young Adult literature, cook books and series about historical figures, to educate their children.

Our Books on Wheels service serves some 40 individuals, who are often isolated and alone. The JPL provides one of their only contacts with the outside world. We

bring to our shut-in members not only books but also social contact and, if necessary and appropriate, we can alert Ometz as to important issues. In the past year, we calculate that, through some 350 deliveries a year, we delivered more than 9,800 books to our shut-in members providing them with more than \$340,000 in book value, assuming that they would have been able to access these books themselves, which they cannot.

In the past year, the value of everything borrowed by users in the JPL subsidized and newcomer membership categories amounted to almost \$375,000. The total circulation for the Library in 2018, to be precise, was 88,323 items with a value of some \$3,080,000. We believe that this is a good example of how the JPL meets the terms of reference for the Arts Council of England's first definition of impact.

The JPL animates identity and belonging in our community. Drawing on the Arts Council's second definition of impact (happiness and inspiration), we have, for example, given over 20 rare book workshops in the past year to over 500 people in secondary schools (Jewish and Catholic), CEGEPS, universities, synagogues, and churches. These workshops, increasingly known and in demand, have become spaces in which people come together to learn about their own histories and the histories of others through the lives of books. If you want to see impact, watch the OMG expressions on the faces of young people, whose reading experience has been virtually entirely off of screens, as they hold and look at Flavius Josephus' Antiquities of the Jews, which was printed in 1481.

This, and much more, is what the JPL does. We may remain not entirely certain as to how to measure all this but, going forward, we will be working to calibrate and assign metrics to these things and to use the information that we glean to re-tool, grow, adjust and improve. And we will bear in mind that, with regard to the impact of what the JPL and cultural institutions do, while we may not always be able precisely to define or measure it, we know it when we see it.

The Dr. Michael D. Paul Rare Books Initiative Library

In 2019, the JPL formalized an agreement with Dr. Michael Paul whose support of our rare books collection has extended beyond the initial cataloguing, description, and exhibit that took place during the library's centennial in 2014. In the last 5 years, JPL staff have given over 40 workshops in schools, synagogues, community centres, and other libraries. The workshops are not just sessions in knowledge-sharing: they are interactive and participatory gatherings in which we contextualize the Jewish narrative from our research of the back stories that together form the religious and socio-political nexus of Jewish thought, printing, and inter-communal associations within the narrative of Jewish book history. 2018-19 saw the highest number of workshops in any one year: we travelled to over 15 locations and gave more than 20 workshops to over 500 high school students, synagogue members, Jewish Studies and Information Science students at McGill, as well as to a class in Jewish mysticism at l'Université de Montréal. For the very first time, we also have workshops in 2 churches: Holy Family Parish and The Unitarian Church of Montreal. These experiences were extraordinary since in both cases, we had the opportunity to teach non-Jews about some of the foundational texts that comprise the Jewish canon.

Other projects within this initiative were devoted to building profile. Nicole Beaudry, one of the three JPL staff was invited to submit a background of the work-shop to la Société bibliographique de France as part of its blog *Le blog de la Société bibliographique de France.*

We also produced a paper that Nicole Beaudry gave at the 2019 conference of the Bibliographical Society Of Canada in Vancouver.

Current and forthcoming:

- The completion of a new website devoted to the rare books we have been sharing at the workshops by the end of the year.
- Cataloguing and description of the 250 rare books held at the Alex Dworkin Canadian Jewish Archives.
- Additional workshops within Montreal and in Ottawa.

Jewish Genealogy in the Schools – "Where do You Think You Come From"

Thanks to Anthony Shine, the restructuring of his late father's endowment for books on Jewish genealogy has been reconstituted as an historical literacy educational programme that the JPL is developing for use in secondary schools. We are developing a module that will be used as a pilot project at Bialik High School in 2020, which will teach young people how to research their family histories as an adjunct tool to learning historiography. The JPL is working with experts from the Montreal Jewish Genealogical Society to develop this program that will be deployed just prior to when students travel on the March of the Living in the spring.

The Rosenberg Ilan

In 2013, Dr. Lawrence Rosenberg and his brother Barry donated an artefact created by their great-great grandfather, the illustrious Rabbi Yehuda Yudel Rosenberg, a Hasidic rabbi from Skaraschev in Poland. Rabbi Rosenberg was a renown scholar, scribe, holistic doctor, artist, storyteller, with a broad interest in science and the world beyond the yeshiva. Yehudah Yudel is also Mordecai Richler's grandfather.

The artefact in question is an ilan, a kabbalistic tree in the long tradition of divinity maps produced by Jewish mystics since the Middle Ages. It is a 12-foot rotulus (rolled vertically as opposed to horizontally like a scroll) made of cotton rag paper and drawn with iron gall ink, material highly-susceptible to humidity and temperature change. This past year, the ilan was sent to the Canadian Conservation Institute in Ottawa where it will be treated and stabilized. In the autumn of 2020, the JPL will be presenting it in conjunction with a symposium that is currently in the planning stages.

Art Hives with the Archives

As a way of bringing our archival collections to life, the JPL ran an interactive series of workshops surrounding various items in the archives, accompanied by an adult craft. Our "Paint Night" for instance, explored the history of the Schmatta business in Montreal while participants painted a still life of an archival treasure, our very own sewing machine. The workshops were led by Jessica Zimmerman.

JPL Next Chapter

Two sessions of Books and Booze, formally Reading between the Wines took place this year, targeting a wide range of topics which appeal to the 25-40 age demographic. From Rachel S. Harris' analysis of women's representation in Israeli film in line with her book *Warriors, Witches, Whores: Women in Israeli Cinema* to the duo of Bethany Ball and Spencer Wise, authors of *What to do about the Solomons* and The Emperor of Shoes, each evening was intimate, small and thought-provoking.

Russian Outreach

The Russian Literary Club, "Sobesednik" (Conversations), led by Valentina Rojinskaia has had a very successful year. Meeting monthly, with over 150 members, concerts, theatrical performances and literary discussions keep attendees coming back for more. At each of these sessions, the JPL's book exchange "Knigovorot" brought members to bring books from their personal collections to exchange for those of other members and a few provided by the library. The Annual Russian Cultural Evening celebrated its 13th year with a sold out show entitled "Maple Leaves, Russian Parks". The JPL also held courses in Russian for Beginners.

Disability and Inclusion

This year, the library participated in Jewish Disability, Awareness and Inclusion Month with an American Sign Language Storytime led by Susanna Opedissano for children and their families looking to learn ASL. In order to better serve the Deaf and Hard-of-Hearing community, The JPL held courses in American Sign Language both at the Beginners' and Intermediate levels. The finale of the Israeli Film Festival "Shoelaces" was also part of the JDAIM calendar, the story of a complicated relationship between an aging father and a disabled son. The Library staff was also able to benefit from training on disability awareness and inclusion through a partnership with the Sylva Adams YM-YWHA through a Pushing the Boundaries: Disability, Inclusion and Jewish Community grant.

BreakOut Games

The JPL held a number of Breakout Games for camps and after school programs this year. Like the popular "Adventure Rooms", these games are educational, teambuilding and entertaining. The library caters its games to the particular group, whether it's a corporate teambuilding activity, an opportunity to learn research skills for a class of elementary school students or a lesson in geography. Breakout experiences are portable and have been brought to schools, community centers and day camps.

Books-On-Wheels

The Books-on-Wheels program has expanded to offer free eBooks to patients at the Jewish General Hospital. New homebound patrons continue to be added and the program is continuously in demand. The JPL continues to partner with the Fraser Hickson Library on this program.

SchoolsVisits, Tours and Presentations

Outreach through collaborations Once the school year began, the JPL opened its doors to elementary, high school, CEGEP and University students. With general interest tours as well as workshops crafted specifically for particular student groups, the JPL staff helped to make our collections and information more accessible. From homeschooled groups such as the Limmud Center, to Bar/Bat Mitzvah groups, to CEGEPS (Dawson College, Marianopolis College) and Universities (McGill, Concordia). The JPL also brought a number of visits and presentations at the Cummings Center for seniors.

Writing Workshops and Support for Local Authors

The JPL, for the 5th consecutive year, was a drop-in location for National Novel Writing Month, in which aspiring authors challenge themselves to write 10K words during the month of November. The library held weekly write-in drop-ins, as well as a launch party with snacks and coffee for ambitious writers. There were also two sessions of writing workshops led by Michelle Franklin.

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The Norman Berman Children's Library

We continue to build a programming calendar that is engaging, educational and inspiring to children of all ages and their families. We strive to provide enriching activities that are affordable and accessible to all reaches of the local Montreal community.

The NBCL offers pre-school music classes 5 days a week for 10 months per year. Music is just as important as books and reading at this pivotal stage of development. The generosity of the **Azrieli Foundation** allows us to offer a diverse pre-school music program with daily "mom and tot" music classes, a drop-in music and stories morning that serves up to 3 daycares per week and three preschool music concerts per year. We have expanded our music repertoire by offering classes with **La La Lesley** and **Monkey Rock Music** in addition to our long-time musical performer **Linda Kravitz**.



Our annual Holiday Concert with Grammy-award winning singer/songwriter **Jennifer Gasoi** saw 300 guests fill the Gelber Conference Hall. In April, we partnered with the Sylvan Adams YM-YWHA to host **Will Stroet of Will's Jams on CBC Kids** for a family concert that welcomed over 100 people. In July, **Bach Before Bedtime** saw 80 people come for a classical music and story interlude in which the children came in their pyjamas and were invited to engage with the musicians and their instruments. We offer **drop in story time** during the week and in the summer **"Bedtime Storytime"** for young children and their caregivers. We continue to host weekly storytimes for the children of **Yaldei school**. During the summer, **Yaldei summer camp** and **Trails of Summer camp** for children with special needs have been coming to the library for special story times and activities in the library.

Sunday mornings are continually evolving with new and engaging programs. **Sunday morning story time** now also hosts musical appearances by **La La Lesley, Getting Moving with Lilly** and stories and crafts with our new storyteller **Tania Baladi.**

Jewish Book Month in November was incredible; we were fortunate to have two authors come to Montreal for school visits. Jacqueline Jules, who spoke to grades 1-4, and Marsha Skrypuch, who spoke to upper elementary and high school students, were both dynamic and engaging, leaving their audiences clamoring for more. It is our intention to continue to bring in two authors, one for younger grades and one for older, to broaden our range of appeal and relevance to students and school visits.

We launched the NBCL's first annual **Hannukah Extravaganza**, in which we took over the entire Children's Library with music, stories, crafts, 3D art and of course latkes and sufganiyot. Over 80 people joined us for what was the start of a beautiful tradition!

The second manifestation of the MTL YA FEST at the end of May was a great success. We hosted 22 authors from all over Canada and the United States for a full day event. What a boon to have Order of Canada recipient and Governor General award winner Tim Wynne-Jones. We saw a 30% increase in attendance; some of our participants came from as far as Boston, MA, Michigan, Toronto and Ottawa. This year we collaborated with CBC Montreal to feature their Indigenous Fiction "Turtle Island Reads" program. The three authors featured in their program hosted a panel dedicated to Indigenous and First Nations fiction. The finale to the Turtle Island Reads feature was a musical performance by Inuit Throat Singer Nina Segalowitz and Montreal fiddler and musician Jonathan Moorman. It was a lively festival atmosphere with music, books and book merchandise and the buzz of avid readers engaged and inspired.

The Archives of the Jewish Public Library



Moderated by Sarah Deshaies of CJAD radio, Edith Kuper of the Dora Wasserman Yiddish Theatre Archives, Aviv Milgram from the Museum of Jewish Montreal, and Jessica Zimmerman, Director of the Jewish Public Library Archives, discuss the preservation of local cultural heritage in honour of the premier of A Century Songbook at the Segal Centre.

The Jewish Public Library Archives (JPL-A) has had a busy and fruitful year, continuing with its digitization and access efforts, but also participating in exhibitions and events that increased the profile of the library. To date, over 25,000 pages of historical documents have been digitized and made accessible on the Canadian Jewish Heritage Network (www.cjhn.ca), due in large part to the support of the Peter and Ellen Jacobs Virtual Archives Fund. These digitization efforts have fueled the specialized and diverse endeavors the Archive has engaged in.

Kicking off the season with a successful in-house exhibition featuring Rita Briansky's artwork, the JPL- A has launched a year full of visual displays. Over the last twelve months, the JPL-A has partnered with the Pointe-à-Callière Museum, who debuted two large scale projects using resources from the JPL-A. The Archives and its materials have been be included in a permanent exhibition titled, "Les Bâtisseurs de Montréal", a visual journey back in time to Montreal's past under the French and British regimes. In addition, for a period of ten years, images from the Archives will be included in a multimedia show at the museum. The project will evoke the history of Montreal, from the village of Hochelaga to a city of the 21st century.


Additionally, researchers from Place des Arts have been busy working in Archives over the last year, curating material for their newest exhibition on the Women's Symphony Orchestra. In particular, rare and fragile recordings from the Ethel Stark collection (founder of the orchestra), have been digitized and will be premiered to the public for the first time at the exhibition launch. The show is expected to open in the fall.

This year, the JPL-A has been the recipient of many new accessions. In addition to over forty-five new personal/ family collections, the Archive has recently acquired large community collections from B'nai Brith Hillel, the Bronfman Jewish Education Centre, Ometz, and the Hebrew Free Loan Association of Montreal. In total, the JPL-A has accessioned over 60 linear feet of material in the last year.

Specialized outreaching and programming continues for classrooms, organizations, individual groups and more. Examples of the Archive's recent initiatives include Bar/ Bat Mitzvah groups for Doshei Emet, "historical detectives" programs with United Talmud Torah, volunteering groups with St Georges High School, and a student-driven podcast program undertaken with McGill University.

For the fifth year in a row, the JPL-A was able to offer an internship to a young person looking for experience in the archival world. The Sonia and David Oberman Archival Internship was award to Tim Sullivan. Mr. Sullivan is continuing essential inventory and collection management protocols. In addition, the archive would like to thank its dedicated roster of over 10 volunteers for their participation and support.

Taking Stock - Taking Action

This past fiscal year was one of transition and renewal. We took stock of what skills, training and structures we need to succeed in achieving our fundraising goals and continue putting into place the resources and processes necessary to build financial stability for the Jewish Public Library over the long term.

Under the leadership of the Executive Director and with the encouragement and support of the Library Board, a new Director of Development, Sarah Tobias, and a new Development Associate, Na'ama Freeman, were hired to set the Library up for fundraising effectiveness focusing on long-term operational support.

We assembled a team comprised of Library staff and several Board members and began Year One of a fouryear partnership with the Harold Grinspoon Foundation Life & Legacy Programme. The purpose of this collaboration is to acquire the training and skills we need to work with our donors to create legacy gifts for the Library.

We have been training on Blackbaud's Raiser's Edge so we can leverage data to make more informed fundraising decisions and deepen our understanding of our donors' philanthropic interests. Year after year, we are most grateful to Federation for the core support they provide to the Library through the annual CJA Campaign and to the longstanding support of a major Foundation (anonymous) for cultural programmes. We would like to recognize and thank the Cote-des-Neiges-Notre-Dames-de-Graces Borough for their support of our community outreach activities and the Canadian Federal Government for their support of the Summer Student Programme.

This past fiscal year was marked by several extraordinary gifts from individuals, families and foundations, as well as by substantial revenue raised by the Library's treasured circle of Friends. 




